This course is equivalent to a first-second year college course Spanish language skills. This year we will work on many different verb tenses along with continued speech development. We will still use TPR Storytelling to teach through comprehensible input. This class has a very different dynamic because there are actually two different levels of Spanish in the class to each level will have different expectations. Spanish III students will need to meet communication expectations on the ACTFL communication under intermediate low, while students in Spanish IV will be asked to progress to intermediate mid. There will also be assignments outside of class for the different levels. Vocabulary will need to be reviewed every day in order to stay on target. Because this is an advanced course we will speak almost exclusively Spanish. This is the year that you should start to produce more language as opposed to the past couple of years when you have spent most of the time listening and acquiring speech sounds.


You must speak only Spanish in class
